Medical Student Profile Sabrina Leong

Sabrina joined the SWB team in 2016 when she was a 3rd year medical student at Monash University.

What prompted your interest in SWB?

I have a great interest in global health. I was particularly attracted to the emphasis on medical education given that education is a sustainable initiative which can improve global health. I wanted to get a taste of the healthcare systems and medical education in Malawi and Zimbabwe, and gain some insight as to how such initiatives are run.

What did you learn during your trip?

During the trip, I had the opportunity to interact with health care professionals and students

from Malawi and Zimbabwe and learn about the similarities and differences in our healthcare systems and medical education. I learnt about the different ways they adapted their healthcare practices to accommodate their lack of resources.

How did your experience compare to other global health programs?

As I had never been involved in a global health program which focusses on medical education before, it was an insightful first experience and I was exposed to how such initiatives are run. It was heartening to know that

the knowledge passed on to the participants would not just end there, but then be used to benefit the many other people whom they will serve.

Any recommendations for students who want to get involved?

I would recommend taking the opportunity as soon as it arises. I remember being quite apprehensive initially because I didn't know anyone who was going and had to take time off uni, but it turned out to be a really rewarding experience with a really welcoming and friendly team.

What is your professional position?

I am a Nephrologist and Obstetrics Physician and Dean and Professor of Medicine at Western Sydney University.

Why did you join the SWB team?

I was inspired to join the team after hearing good things from SWB team member and colleague Prof Peter Zelas who has been a member of the SWB teaching team a number of times.

What was the highlight of your trip?

The highlight was the number and range of skills of the participants, their knowledge and willingness to learn and teach us.

What do you recommend for those wanting to join the SWB team?

I recommend being prepared to provide a range of materials, being flexible and being responsive to local knowledge, patterns of disease and local need.

What is your current professional position?

I'm an Unaccredited Plastic/Reconstructive Surgery Registrar at Southwest Health Care in Warrnambool, Victoria.

What motivated you to join the SWB team?

I had previous experiences in South Africa doing placement in Soweto and found that to be such an incredible experience working in an environment that was so different than what we have in Australia. I have also always had a keen interest in global health and medical education and was looking for a chance to explore those fields. The opportunity arose in 2016 to join the SWB team and I thought it would be a great opportunity to achieve these goals.



What was the highlight of the 2016 trip?

The highlight of the trip was the suturing workshop. The students seemed to really enjoy it and the positive feedback was very encouraging. I would also have to mention the chance to meet and travel with the SWB team as a whole. Some of the team's dancing at a nightclub in Blantyre was worth the 24 hour flight by itself.

What would you recommend for junior doctors wanting to join the team?

I couldn't recommend the program highly enough for any junior doctors. For anyone who hasn't experienced the medical field in a low resource setting it is a great opportunity to not only teach but learn from junior staff and students in Malawi and Zimbabwe. The lectures from the SWB senior teachers are also great for junior doctors.
