Dr Robert Cooper travelled with SWB to Malawi and Rwanda in 2012. Robert is a radiologist working at the Royal Adelaide Hospital and in private practice with Radiology SA. He describes his impressions of the trip:

Travelling like this to nontourism Africa is a great opportunity to put one's "first world" problems into perspective – the SWB concept provided for me that perfect synergy of having a great time whilst doing something useful. Know Your National Executive Committee...Introducing Dr Katherine Edyvane

SWB is extremely fortunate to be led by an exceptional National Executive Committee.

Each newsletter edition we will be introducing one of our committee members so you can find out a little more about the fantastic people at our helm. First in line is Dr Katherine Edyvane.

Katherine is a general surgeon and Head of Department at Rockingham General Hospital in Perth, Western Australia. She spent her formative years in Tasmania, gaining a Bachelor of Science and Honours degree in Zoology and Biochemistry at the University of Tasmania, where she was also introduced to student activist socialist politics and environmental issues. passions she still holds today. Later she gained a PhD in medical research from the Flinders University of South Australia and was a junior lecturer in the School of Medicine.

At the ripe old age of 27 Katherine decided to fulfil her life-long desire to study Medicine and become a surgeon. Being a perennial student, in her spare time she had to work as

a medical researcher to fund her medical studies. She established from scratch, and led for 10 years, a very productive Urology Research Laboratory at the Repatriation General Hospital Daw Park in South Australia. Katherine then undertook advanced surgical training in General Surgery in Perth,WA.

Soon after completing her Fellowship, Katherine led an allfemale surgical team to Pakistanadministered Kashmir to assist in the aftermath of the devastating 2005 earthquake. It was her first experience of working in a disaster zone and in a resource-poor setting. Later followed a 2-year contract in Timor Leste as the surgeon advisor to the civilian Dili National Hospital, where she encountered and managed the full spectrum of surgery. Since 2009, Katherine has continued to visit Timor Leste as a short-term surgeon advisor, and developing educational surgical programs for the country, as well as yearly locums to Alice Springs Hospital.

It was also in 2009 that Katherine discovered

Specialists Without Borders and she impressed the executive not only with her teaching and experience in resource-poor countries, but with her relaxed style and "Che Guevara" T-shirt! Katherine has more than 20 years experience in teaching at the undergraduate and post-graduate level, obtained \$500,000 in research grants and has published over 40 journal articles.
